CHAPTER ONE

EXCHANGE PROGRAM to the UNITED STATES



he Kosciuszko Foundation Exchange Program to the United States, enables Polish scholars to conduct research, artistic or study projects at accredited institutions of higher learning in the United States. During the academic year 2019/2020, our scholars faced an unprecedented challenge - the Covid-19 global pandemic. Out of the 38 scholars participating in the Program, 26 managed to finish their projects without disruptions, five decided to shorten their stay and return to Poland, while six deferred their research to the next academic year and one withdrew from participation in the Program. The KF was swiftly informing the Program participants about the latest guidelines of the Center for Disease Control (CDC), as well as travel information and advisories from the US and Polish governments, and spared no effort to ensure the safety of our scholars. None of the KF Fellows and Grantees contracted the novel coronavirus and all safely returned to Poland. Despite these unforeseen difficulties, all of the awardees expressed satisfaction with the Program and completed the objectives of their projects.

Selection Process

For the 2019/2020 edition of the Exchange Program to the U.S. we received 104 applications. The Exchange Program Officer verified all applications to ensure they met the eligibility criteria of the Exchange Program to the U.S. and presented the qualifying applications to the U.S. Academic Advisory Committee Members. The U.S. Academic Advisory Committee selected 86 candidates for in-person interviews in Poland. From February 18th to February 28th, 2019 members of the U.S. Academic Advisory Committee, together with members of the Polish Academic Commission, held the in-person interviews at the University of Warsaw's Collegium Artes Liberales in Warsaw.


All interviews were conducted in English, thereby evaluating the English proficiency of the candidates. Each interview lasted approximately 30 minutes. Following the interviews, the candidates were ranked on a scale of 1-10, where 1 is the lowest and 10 is the highest score. Discussions at the end of each interview created a basis for evaluating the overall excellence taking into consideration the following factors:


candidate's qualifications and accomplishments, importance of the project, written proposal, site of acceptance and overall impression from the applicant's presentation. The Commission had an opportunity to review the files of all candidates beforehand to evaluate the merit of the candidates' research. proposals, their clarity and seriousness of purpose, and the persuasiveness of their arguments for conducting research in the United States.

For the academic year 2019/2020, 38 candidates were matched for possible funding and finally 31 scholars participated in the Program, bringing awarded funding to \$305,121.18

The Kosciuszko Foundation would like to take this opportunity to express its sincere appreciation to the members of the U.S. Academic Advisory Committee and Polish Academic Commission, whose members reviewed and interviewed all the applicants for the Exchange Program to the United States.



In the academic year 2019/2020, our grants were awarded to scholars for Polish studies as well as research in medicine, psychology, chemistry, biology, cultural and social studies, history, mathematics, economic, linguistics, philosophy, law, literature and art.

THE KOSCIUSZKO FOUNDATION FELLOWSHIPS

allow postgraduate scholars, professionals or artists who have completed their Ph.D. to undertake postdoctoral research in the U.S. for 3 - 9 months.

THE KOSCIUSZKO FOUNDATION

allow graduate degree (M.A., M.S.) scholars, professionals, or artists to conduct research in the U.S. for 3 -9 months

THE KOSCIUSZKO **FOUNDATION FFIIOWSHIPS**

allow university faculty members to teach classes at U.S. universities. for up to 10 months. The lectures should focus on Polish Studies. including Polish language teaching and Polish culture. Teaching fellows may also undertake their research while lecturing.





SPECIAL and IRAVEL GRANTS





CHAPTER THREE

DOMESTIC SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS for AMERICAN CITIZENS

he Kosciuszko Foundation's domestic scholarships and scholarships administered on behalf of other organizations for the 2019-2020 academic year are awarded based on the following:

TUITION SCHOLARSHIPS (domestic scholarship program) are awarded to U.S. citizens and permanent residents of Polish descent for graduate studies in any field at colleges and universities in the United States and to Americans of non-Polish descent whose studies at American universities are primarily focused on Polish subjects.

All awards are competitive and are based on academic excellence with a minimum GPA of 3.0 and involvement in the Polish American community. A minimum GPA of 3.5 is required for The Drs. James and Wanda Trefil Scholarship. Financial need is taken into consideration and documentation proving Polish ancestry is required.

Eighty-three (83) students received scholarships for academic year Fall 2019/Spring 2020. The total for Domestic Scholarships for the academic year 2019-2020, and scholarships administered by the Kosciuszko Foundation on behalf of other organizations is \$236,565.

Exchange Programs to Poland

he Kosciuszko Foundation's Exchange Programs to Poland include: THE YEAR ABROAD SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM and THE GRADUATE AND POSTGRADUATE STUDIES AND RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM. The Year Abroad Scholarship Program allows American students to study Polish at the Jagiellonian University's Center of Polish Language and Culture in Cracow, Poland. The Graduate and Postgraduate Studies and Research Scholarship Program provides U.S. citizens with opportunities to conduct research or graduate studies level at universities in Poland.

Selection Process

The Year Abroad Scholarship Program applications were evaluated based on grade point average, recommendation letters and the applicant's essay. The Graduate and Postgraduate Studies and Research Scholarship Program applications were evaluated based on qualifications and accomplishments, importance of the project, written proposal and the host institution. All applications were screened for completeness and eligibility by the Kosciuszko Foundation's Selection Committee including the KF Grants Department and Marek Skulimowski, President and Executive Director. Additionally, applications for the Year Abroad Program were reviewed and accepted by Prof. Waldemar Martyniuk, Director of the Center for Polish Language and Culture at the Jagiellonian University, Cracow.


Awarded Scholarships

The Kosciuszko Foundation funding for the academic year 2019/2020 for the Studies and Research program was **\$6,900** and for the Year Abroad program, it stood at **\$6,300**. Funding was provided from The Ted and Walter Wysocki Scholarship Fund.

In addition to the Kosciuszko Foundation scholarships, all candidates in these Programs receive grants from the National Agency for Academic Exchange (NAWA) as a monthly stipend of 1,600 PLN per month for housing and living expenses. The Year Abroad Program scholarship also includes a tuition fee waiver at the discretion of the Rector of the Jagiellonian University.








CHAPTER FOUR

TEACHING ENGLISH in POLAND PROGRAM



TFIP 2019 and 2020

uring these demanding times, it's good to look back at some of our best achievements, see how we managed to adapt to ongoing changes and draw optimistic conclusions for the future. This is a process we have been undergoing within the Teaching English in Poland program. Last year, we were connecting American volunteers with children all around Poland. This year, due to the pandemic, we were forced to move our program online, but the connection is still there. This enables us to feel hopeful about the future of TEIP - whatever challenges the world might bring us, we are able to adapt, find ways to achieve our goals and remain in touch across the Atlantic.

TEIP 2019: American Volunteers in Action all Around Poland for the 29th Time!

The Kosciuszko Foundation's Teaching English in Poland program is centered around American volunteers who come to chosen summer camps all around Poland to teach English to children and to familiarize them with American culture through sports, art and cultural projects. We were happy to organize the 29th edition of TEIP together with our Polish team. 2019 was a year of new adventures and new friends!

As part of TEIP, during summer vacation, we provide Polish students with an opportunity to improve their language skills. They learn under the careful eye of experienced American teachers (around a dozen volunteers at each two-week long camp) who conduct workshops in small groups. Teachers are supervised






by a leader responsible for making sure the program runs smoothly and effectively. Teachers, accompanied by their assistants, organize interactive classes which enable Polish students to enrich their vocabulary connected to culture, history, geography, American customs and traditions. Language immersion is key here - we encourage students to let go of any barriers in speaking and to let themselves communicate freely. There is no better way to achieve that than spending summer vacation with native speakers!


Singing American rock classics with a guitar in hand? Building a small summer paper factory and publishing your own book? Learning American dances, how to play the ukulele? Or maybe preparing Polish and American dishes together? Taking part in the TEIP program is an exciting adventure!

Since the very beginning, in 1991, TEIP has been very popular among Polish kids. We have organized over 150 camps all around the country, with thousands of American volunteers who visited Poland. In 2019, 81 American teachers and teaching assistants volunteered for the program from all across the United States.

TFACHING ENGLISH in POLAND

522 Polish students and 115 Polish teachers attended the camps located in Załecze Wielkie, Olsztynek. Cracow and Miłakowo. The program was cocoordinated by **Dorota Kraśniewska** from the Polish office, along with Grażyna Czetwertyńska, Ph.D., and Aleksandra Kujawska.

The Kosciuszko Foundation and our Polish partners offered seven choices to students: four English Language/American Culture Camp Programs and two Arts Enriched English Language Camp Programs. According to annual tradition, the camps were coordinated by the following TEIP leaders:

- CRACOW, ACADEMOS SCHOOL **Cindy Peiper**
- MIŁAKOWO SCHOOL COMPLEX Dawn Wovak
- OLSZTYNEK, the Czernecki Foundation camp in OSW ZHP Perkoz **Dolly Parker**
- ZAŁĘCZE ARTS in Nadwarciański Gród Mary Mitchell
- ZAŁECZE CULTURE in Nadwarciański Gród Kristin Miller

For the first time, the camps were preceded by a workshop for Polish and American staff leaders organized in Konstancin-Jeziorna, Poland, in March. It was a great opportunity for staff members to meet and set common goals and rules before summer vacation. The workshops were completed by sightseeing in Warsaw, a meeting in the Foundation for the Development of Education System and a visit to the School of Education/Teachers College. The participants had a chance to work on teambuilding, sharing their experiences and logistics. It was a great way to begin our annual Polish-American cooperation!

The 2019 TEIP edition received financial support from the Foundation for the Development of Education System and the Polish-American Freedom Foundation. It gained recognition throughout Poland and was discussed during radio auditions (including radio Olsztyn), shown in Public Television and mentioned in the local news. This resulted in higher demand for TEIP among schools all around the country for the 2019/2020 edition of the program.

The TEIP continued into 2020, celebrating its 30th birthday with new locations, new staff members and new camp participants - because every year, we strive to reach as many kids as possible. We were able to continue our fruitful cooperation with our partners and many members of our previous staff - they proved to be an indispensable addition to the program.

TEIP 2020 Becomes Transatlantics and We're Embarking on an Online Journey!

Until the very end of February 2020, we were still hopeful about the possibility of greeting American staff leaders at our annual March workshop in Poland. Everything was planned, hotels were booked, online tickets bought, experts ready to roll. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, we were forced to cancel the workshop, as well as postpone American volunteers' presence at Polish summer camps until further notice. Many of the camps were cancelled all together, or their formula has changed, all in all - nothing was certain. As a result, with the beginning of spring, we decided to move the entire program online. This is how the Transatlantics project was born.

The scope of this project remained the same - bringing American volunteers closer to Polish students, in order to teach them about American culture and the English language. What other way to do that than via ZOOM, Youtube, Facebook and Google Meet? We used all social media and online communication tools that were at our disposal to create a common exchange platform. This is how a TEIP-dedicated Youtube channel was established (The Kościuszko Foundation Poland), where we upload recordings made by American volunteers who were supposed to join us in Poland this year. Short movies span from book-making tutorials to cheerleading courses and easy cooking lessons. But that's not all.

Profiting from its online form, the program also includes expert webinars for Polish and American teachers, recorded in Warsaw, Łódź and Białystok, which feature prominent experts and Polish academics. The Foundation has planned nearly 10 webinars throughout the summer vacation, which touch upon topics such as multicultural aspects in teaching a foreign language,

the mindset approach in education, and the challenges of e-learning. All are open-access and available to viewers across Poland and the United States.

Finally, there is the core of the project - live meetings of Americans with Polish children, mostly from camps which were supposed to take place this year, but since August, the program is opening to other students as well. These consist of music nights, discussions on topics such as American national parks, history and fashion. American teachers send out a ZOOM link to the Polish team, which is further made accessible to children and their parents. Everyone joins in at 6:30 PM for a transatlantic experience. All in all, including webinars and video recording sent to Poland from the U.S., the KF team has content to share nearly everyday, since the 26th of June until the 1st of September. This means over 60 meetings with over 40 volunteers and staff leaders. It is going to be an adventurous summer after all!

The online program is coordinated entirely by **Zofia Jaworowska**, with the support of **Aleksandra Kujawska and Grażyna Czetwertyńska**, **Ph.D.**, from the Polish Kościuszko Foundation office. The Foundation's partner, the Foundation for the Development of Education System (FRSE) was generous enough to cofinance TEIP online and enabled this incredible journey.

he history of the Great Charity Ball of the Kościuszko Foundation dates back to 1928 when the first event of this type was organized in memory of Ignacy Jan Paderewski at the Commodore Hotel in New York. The evening gathered distinguished quests and remained in the minds of all participants. The great success and need to consistently promote our mission encouraged the founders to maintain the tradition and organize a ball every year since then.

The first official ball was held in 1933 at the Pennsylvania Hotel in New York and in 1936 it was relocated to the famous Waldorf Astoria. Thanks to prominent and distinguished guests, the ball's popularity grew not only in the Polish community but in the greater community too. In 1941, a tradition adopted from the royal courts or as in Mickiewicz's "Pan Tadeusz", debutants were presented at the ball. Fathers in tailcoats led the girls to the salons with their dance steps. Each year, the ball begins with the famous traditional dance - the Polonaise.

To what do we owe the success of the Kościuszko Foundation's Great Ball? Polish strength and the determination of the Polish community in the United States. It is the cultivation of Polish traditions and pride that mobilizes us to celebrate with our compatriots. For over 85 years, on the last Saturday of April, we have gathered in a sophisticated

group to remember our country and promote the achievements of our community. Thanks to this multi-generational tradition, the Kościuszko Foundation raises considerable funds for sponsoring its activities and helping scholarship holders, scholarship programs and scientific exchanges.

This year, due to the health and safety of the participants, the Kosciuszko Foundation's Great Ball has been canceled. For the Foundation. this means unfathomable losses. Thanks to your support and generous donations, the Foundation was able to endure the difficult year and sponsored scholarships remained funded. We are extremely grateful for your loyalty and understanding. For this reason, we would like to apologize to you for not being able to host the ball once again/

The decision is very difficult, but the health of our guests is our utmost priority.

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



KE CUITURAL ACTIVITIES

2019 has been a commemorative year in the Polish-America community as it marked the 100th anniversary of diplomatic relations between Poland and the United States.

To celebrate this proud occasion, the Kosciuszko Foundation partnered with the Adam Mickiewicz Institute in presenting two music productions put on by American artists that pay tribute to Ignacy Jan Paderewski, a celebrated composer, statesman and icon of Poland's independence.

The first presentation was "3 PADEREWSKIS" - an Opera in One Act, by Jenni Brandon with libretto by Oliver Mayer, which had its world premiere on November 20, 2019 at the Terrace Theater at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. - the U.S. National Cultural Center. The latter project was a live concert recording of "VIRTUOSO" - a musical about life of I.J. Paderewski, which was held at the DiMenna Center for Classical Music in NYC, featuring performances from Broadway cast members.

The season's highlight also includes "THE MANY FACES OF TAMARA DE LEMPICKA" exhibit featuring the artist's works, documents and memorabilia. The exhibit, curated by **Bartek Remisko**, marked the first New York presentation of de Lempicka's art in nearly eighty years. It was perhaps Foundation's most well attended event of the season with nearly 300 people present at the opening reception. The Foundation expresses its gratitude to Victoria de Lempicka, Marisa de Lempicka and Anne & Richard Paddy, and private collectors who wish to remain anonymous, for making their collections available for presentation to the public; to Andrew Kenda for inspiration, and to Ms. Krystyna Piórkowska, the project's exclusive sponsor.












Throughout the season the Foundation also hosted a series of lectures and author's evenings treating on Polish historical, intellectual and cultural legacy.

Prof. George G. Grabowicz of Harvard University along with Irena Lasota of the Institute for Democracy in Eastern Europe discussed the immense contribution of **JERZY GIEDROYC** to Polish politics and literature.



In September, to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the start of the WWII, an award-winning journalist, bestselling author, and former KF scholarship recipient **Andrew** Nagorski elaborated on his new book: "1941: The Year Germany Lost the War."





Jarosław Anders, a literary critic, translator and author gave an insightful presentation on MAREK HLASKO (1934-1969), one of the most influential Polish writers of the 20th century.



A series of music events this season included a recital of Polish songs by the winner of 2018 KF Marcella Sembrich International Voice Competition -Alexandra Nowakowski, soprano; a recital celebrating the artistic legacy of Polish-Jewish composer Roman Ryterband performed by excellent Polish-American pianist Anna Kijanowska, and "NEW CURRENTS" concert featuring modern/jazz music and songs to the



poems by Polish poet Jan Lechon

Deputy Director of the Royal Łazienki Museum Izabela **Zychowicz,** and curator of paintings Dorota Juszczak, gave a talk on the history of the Royal Łazienki, and the vast collection of paintings gathered by king Stanislaw August Poniatowski at his residence.

Year 2020 of cultural activities began with four sold out events.

ON JANUARY 12

we held a traditional children's event featuring Christmas Carols singing and Santas... Santas... art exhibit.



ON FEBRUARY 11

over 150 guests attended "LIFE IN **IMAGES,"** a retrospective exhibition of works and presentation by Janusz Kapusta, an illustrator, painter and set designer, whose works are in collections of many museums and galleries around the world, including MOMA.





ON JANUARY 29

a full house of guests listened in complete silence the Chopin recital performed by Takeshi Nagayasu, 2019 KF Chopin Piano Competition winner held at the Foundation's concert hall.



ON FEBRUARY 20

awarded film producer, author and director Andrzej Krakowski, in his talk "MUNK, HAS, WAJDA AND POLANSKI. THE INCREDIBLE STORY OF THE KAMERA UNIT" gave as always a very informative, insightful and entertaining presentation on how Polish filmmakers made internationally acclaimed movies in times of raging censorship in communist Poland of the 1960s.





Due to Covid-19 pandemic all further events, which had been scheduled to take place at the Foundation's house, had to be cancelled. However, we managed to present some of them on our new virtual stage: the KF YouTube channel and Zoom technology.

ON MAY 28, 2020,

Dr. Krystyna Iłłakowicz (Yale University) and **Dr. Kathleen** Cioffi (Princeton University Press) discussed the work of TADEUSZ **KANTOR**, a seminal director/visual artist who exerted a profound influence on other theater practitioners worldwide.



ON JUNE 11, 2020

Political scientist and expert on the Polish American relations, and former KF grant recipient, Prof. **Bohdan Szklarski** of the University of Warsaw and Weiser Family Distinguished Fellow and former US Ambassador to Poland **Daniel** Fried elaborated on the political, economic, cultural, environmental and security cooperation between Poland and the USA as viewed from the perspective of each country.



ON JUNE 23, 2020

The internationally renowned chemist, pharmacologist, and vision scientist, Prof. Krzysztof Palczewski spoke on CHEMISTRY AND BIOLOGY OF VISION, and discussed visual perception and pharmacological treatment of patients suffering from blinding diseases. The webinar was presented as part of the KF Collegium of the Eminent Scientists Event Series.

Kosciuszko Foundation Art Collection

he Kosciuszko Foundation is a home of a prestigious art collection of Polish masters, including pieces by J. Matejko, J. Brandt, J. Malczewski, the Styka family, the Kossak family, among others. They are on permanent display in the Foundation's galleries in New York City and Washington, DC. Such an extensive and precious collection requires continuous conservation and restoration works to preserve the beauty of the artworks. In the past years, we have managed to conserve with the support of individual and institutional sponsors, including the Foundation's Trustees and the Polish & Slavic Federal Credit Union

In the fiscal year 2019-2020, the Kosciuszko Foundation applied for a grant offered by the Ministry of Culture and National Heritage of the Republic of Poland as

a part of the program to preserve the Polish cultural heritage abroad. The Foundation received 25,000 PLN (approx. 6,500 USD), which covered 79.8 % of the project.

The following artwork was conserved and restored: Boleslaw Czedekowski "Kosciuszko at West Point", oil on canvas, 60 x 73 inches, 1947

"Kosciuszko at West Point" hangs permanently over the fireplace in the Gallery of Polish Masters at the Kosciuszko Foundation in New York. It was painted expressly for the Foundation by Czedekowski at the request of its president, dr. Stephen P. Mizwa.

The conservation and restoration of the painting were conducted by Ms. Anna Leliwa, Boston, MA.

AFFILIATED GROUPS

The National Advisory Council

The National Advisory Council is composed of several individual members of the Kosciuszko Foundation, as well as presidents of the Kosciuszko Foundation's nine Chapters. The Council is designed to benefit from broad representation throughout the United States providing the Board of Trustees with valuable advice on how to expand membership and donations, by highlighting and discussing current trends amongst the Foundation's target groups, and developing ideas on how to attract new membership and donations given these trends. Its members are longtime Foundation members who have their finger on the pulse of the Foundation, its philosophy, and its future.

Chapters of the Kosciuszko Foundation

The Kosciuszko Foundation chapters play a vital role in maintaining the Foundation's reputation as a nationwide organization. Run strictly by local volunteers who commit considerable time and effort to the task of soliciting members in their geographic areas, organizing local concerts, awards banquets, and other key fundraising events, representatives of nine Kosciuszko Foundation Chapters act as local ambassadors, promoting the Foundation's mission in local regions.

Through the participation of local chapter presidents on the National Advisory Council, chapters also help keep the Board of Trustees, officers, and staff informed of local trends in local communities.



The Pro Arte **League**

For all those visitors to the Foundation House who find it an aesthetic and hospitable place to visit, they can thank the Pro Arte League.

Founded by women members of the Kosciuszko Foundation in 1970 with a mission to raise funds for the preservation and beautification of the public rooms for the Kosciuszko Foundation house, the Pro Arte League has played an indispensable role in keeping the Foundation House in its current pristine condition. Beginning with fashion show fundraisers in the early part of its history, the League now uses its annual fundraising luncheon as a showcase for young Polish-American musicians and other fine Polish and Polish American performing artists.



The Polish American Teachers Association

Polish American Teachers Association (PATA) was founded in 1973 in order to help accurately inform the American public about Poland and the role and contributions of Polish Americans in American society. PATA's relationship with the Kosciuszko Foundation began shortly after formation.

PATA sponsors a rich schedule of events and activities, including essay and visual arts competitions. One of its more popular programs include a storytelling competition, during which students of Polish heritage who attend Polish supplementary schools gather at the Kosciuszko Foundation in March to tell stories from Polish folklore.

PATA also holds the popular Annual Mikolajki / St. Nicholas Day celebration, which teaches children about traditional Polish Christmas celebrations. PATA has also been a reliable supporter of the Foundation's Teaching English in Poland Program, through regular cash contributions as well as Program volunteers.

Note 1 - Organization

The Kosciuszko Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) was incorporated on December 23, 1925 as a charitable corporation under provisions of the not-for-profit corporation law of the State of New York. The Foundation has been established for educational, scholarship, and cultural purposes. Its objectives are to:

- a. Foster among the American people knowledge and appreciation of Polish culture, history, and traditions;
- b. Strengthen understanding, goodwill, and friendship between the people of the United States of America and the people of Poland by promoting closer educational and cultural relations;
- c. Enhance knowledge of the Polish contribution to world civilization in general and to America in particular;
- d. Encourage and promote the study of Polish culture, history, language, and traditions of the United States of America; and
- Foster among Americans of Polish ancestry a deeper understanding and appreciation of their cultural heritage, thereby enriching the pluralistic culture and traditions of the United States of America.

The Foundation conducts and/or sponsors programs, projects, and activities designed to support its purposes and objectives. Its primary sources of revenue are contributions and investment return.

Warsaw Office

The Foundation maintains an office in Warsaw as a representative office providing information about the Foundation's exchange program with the U.S. and provides assistance to Americans studying in Poland under the auspices of a Foundation sponsored program or activity.

Washington Center

The Foundation's Center in Washington D.C. promotes Polish culture in America and encourages cooperation between the United States and Poland. The Center houses a museum of Polish art that is open to the public daily, and provides a venue for local Polish-American events through a wide range of activities, including films, concerts, exhibitions, educational programs, publications, and seminars.

Polish Foundation

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011, the Foundation filed in Poland Articles of Association under the Polish Foundation Act of April 4, 1984 to establish "The Kosciuszko Foundation Poland - Fundacja Kosciuszkowska Polska." This organization is controlled by the United States Kosciuszko Foundation and has similar purposes. All activities of this organization are reported to the U.S. organization and included in these consolidated financial statements. In March 2018,

Note 1 – Organization (continued)

the Foundation and the Polish Foundation signed a cooperation agreement in order to facilitate and improve their continuing non-profit activities and cooperation.

Chapters

There are nine Chapters of the Foundation: Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Washington, DC, Western New York (Buffalo), Chicago, Rocky Mountain (Denver), New England (Springfield), Texas (Houston), and Northeast Ohio (Cleveland).

Note 2 - New Accounting Pronouncements

Effective July 1, 2019, the Foundation adopted new US GAAP revenue recognition guidance which provides a single comprehensive model for entities to use in accounting for revenue recognition arising from contracts with customers and supersedes most current revenue recognition guidance. The new revenue recognition guidance does not apply to how contributions and pledges are recognized, as they are specifically scoped out of the new guidance. The core principle of the new guidance is that an entity should recognize revenue from the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration the entity expects to receive for those promised goods and services. The guidance includes a five step framework to determine the timing and amount of revenue to recognize related to contracts with customers. In addition, this guidance requires new or expanded disclosures related to judgements made by the entities when following the framework. The Foundation adopted ASU 2014-19 on a modified prospective basis and has determined there to be no material impact on its financial statements.

In June 2018, the FASB issued ASU 2018-08, Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. ASU 2018-08 provides a framework for evaluating whether grants and contributions should be accounted for as exchange transactions or as nonexchange transactions. The Foundation adopted ASU2018-08 on a modified prospective basis and has determined there to be no material impact to its financial statements.

Note 3 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Presentation

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis and in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applicable to not-for-profit organizations.

The Foundation's net assets and revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, the net assets of the Foundation and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net assets without donor restrictions - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Note 3 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Net assets with donor restrictions – time or purpose - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that will be met either by actions of the Foundation, fulfillment of donors' stipulations, or the passage of time.

Net assets with donor restrictions - endowment - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently. Generally, the donors of these assets permit the use of all or part of the income earned on related investments for general or specific purposes.

Revenues are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions unless their use is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Expenses are reported as decreases in net assets without donor restrictions. Gains and losses on investments and other assets or liabilities are reported as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions unless their use is restricted by explicit donor stipulation or by law. Expirations of time or purpose restrictions (i.e., the donor-stipulated purposes have been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as net assets released from restrictions.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Scholarships and Grants

Scholarships and grants are reported as a liability and expense when the recipients have satisfied all conditions of acceptance.

Investments

Investments in equities, iShares and exchange traded mutual funds are valued using quoted market prices. Realized gains are calculated by comparing proceeds to cost under the average cost method. Purchases or sales are recorded on a trade date basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in the Foundation's checking accounts both in the United States and Poland.

Inventory

Inventory, which consists primarily of dictionaries and text books, and is included in prepaid expenses and other assets in the accompanying statements of financial position, is stated at lower of cost or net realizable value with cost determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Note 3 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, except for donated items, which are recorded at the fair value on the date of donation. Individual items costing under \$2,000 are not capitalized. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method. The number of years used in determining depreciation is as follows:

Furniture, fixtures, and equipment 3 - 7 years
Building and improvements 20 - 40 years

Income Taxes

The Foundation is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. It is further classified as a publicly supported organization.

The Foundation recognizes the effect of income tax positions only if those positions are more likely than not to be sustained. Management has determined that the Foundation has no uncertain tax positions that would require financial statement disclosure and/or recognition. The Foundation is no longer subject to examination by the applicable taxing jurisdictions for years prior to June 30, 2017.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefitted. Salaries and benefits are allocated based on estimated time spent by employees. Cost of the K.F. House in New York are allocated based on salaries of New York employees.

Contributions Receivable

Unconditional promises to give (pledges) are reported as revenues in the period pledged. In the case of estates, the contribution is recorded when the will has been admitted to probate and the amount is reasonably determinable. Contributions expected to be received after one year are discounted to their present value. Amortization of the discount is recorded as an additional contribution in accordance with the donor-imposed restrictions, if any, on the contribution.

Art Collections

The Foundation has an extensive collection of artwork and other artifacts, which are the results of numerous donations over the years. Donated artwork or other artifacts are capitalized at their appraised or fair value on the accession date. If collection items are sold, the proceeds from the sale are used to acquire other collection items. Gains or losses on the deaccession of collection items are classified on the statements of activities as unrestricted or temporarily restricted support depending on donor restrictions, if any, at the time of accession.

Note 3 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

In June 2015, the art collection in New York was appraised for insurance purposes and the fair value approximated \$5 million. The art collection at the Washington Center received during fiscal 2010 is recorded at approximately \$400,000. During 2020 and 2019, the Foundation received \$5,000 and \$2,000 of donated art.

Note 7 - Commitments

The Foundation has an operating lease for an apartment used by grantees while residing in the United States of America and a lease for office space in Warsaw. Rent expense for the years ended June 30, 2020 and 2019 was \$27,399 and \$21,376, respectively. The future minimum rental commitment under these leases is approximately \$30,200 per year and is renewable every two years. The current lease expires July 2022.

At June 30, 2020, the Foundation was committed, subject to the satisfaction of acceptance conditions, to award scholarships, fellowships, and grants of approximately \$756,050 for the 2020-2021 academic year (September 2020 - May 2021).

Note 10 - Endowment

The Foundation's endowment consists of over one hundred individual funds established for a number of purposes. The endowment includes donor-restricted funds, beneficial interests in charitable trusts and annuity funds, and original gifts held long-term for scholarships and grants.

Interpretation of Relevant Law

Prior to September 17, 2010, the Board of Trustees of the Foundation had interpreted the Uniform Management of Institutional Funds Act (UMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classified as endowment funds (a) the original value of gifts donated to the endowment funds, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the endowment funds, and (c) accumulations to the endowment funds made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund.

Note 10 - Endowment (Continued)

On September 17, 2010, New York State enacted the New York Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (NYPMIFA). Unlike UMIFA, the new law allows not-for-profits to spend endowment funds below their "historic dollar value" if the governing body (Board of Trustees) determines that the spending is prudent in accordance with various factors. Also, in accordance with the act, the Foundation, where possible, has contacted donors of endowment funds with gifts made prior to September 17, 2010, and gave them the choice of following UMIFA or NYPMIFA rules.

The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment funds that is not classified as endowment funds is classified as time or purpose funds until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Foundation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by the Act.

Spending Policy

The Foundation has a policy of appropriating a certain percentage of its portfolio for scholarship distribution annually. Scholarship distribution for fiscal 2020 was based on 4% of its entire portfolio value. In fiscal year 2021 the scholarship distribution is set at 4.5%.

In addition, the Foundation has a policy of appropriating from .5% to 2% of its entire portfolio value for its administrative fee. The percentage is based on a rolling 3 year (fiscal year) average of portfolio value and is set based on the financial needs of the Foundation in a given year.

Note 12 - Fair Value Measurements

The Foundation follows accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("US GAAP") on Fair Value Measurements which defines fair value and establishes a fair value hierarchy organized into three levels based upon input assumptions used pricing assets. Level 1 inputs have the highest reliability and are related to assets with unadjusted quoted prices in active markets. Level 2 inputs relate to assets with other than quoted prices in active markets which may include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities or other inputs which can be corroborated by observable market data. Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs and are used to the extent that observable inputs do not exist.

The Foundation follows US GAAP guidance which removed the requirements to categorize within the fair value hierarchy alternative investments where fair value is measured using the Net Asset Value ("NAV") per share as a practical expedient.

The investments, even in the alternative class, are funds with daily liquidity and are actively traded.

Note 13 - Retirement Plan

The Foundation reinstated its defined contribution pension plan effective July 1, 2014. The plan covers substantially all employees who have completed one year of service. The Foundation will contribute 5% of each employee's salary and make an additional matching contribution up to 5% of salary. Total expense for the years ended June 30, 2020 and 2019 was \$61,217 and \$55,956, respectively.

Note 14 - Concentration of Risk

During 2020 and 2019, the Foundation had U.S. cash in banks exceeding federally insured limits. The Foundation manages this risk by using large, established financial institutions.

Note 15 – Liquidity and Availability of Financial Assets

The following reflects the Foundation's financial assets as of June 30, 2020 and 2019 reduced by amounts not available for general use within one year of that date and adjusted for estimated earnings from beneficial interests in perpetual trusts and endowment spending.

Note 16 - Beneficiary of Trust

A donor had named the Foundation as a beneficiary of a trust that upon his death would be distributed to designated heirs. The donor passed away in June 2019. When all matters are settled, it is estimated that the Foundation will receive at least \$1,000,000 for scholarships.

Note 17 - COVID-19

During the fiscal year, there has been a worldwide Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The pandemic has caused restrictions on travel and cultural events impacting the Foundation and its scholarships. At this time, the future spread of the pandemic and its future cure or treatment cannot be determined. Therefore, management cannot reasonably estimate the impact to future results of operations, cash flows and financial conditions.


Note 18 - Loan

In May 2020, the Foundation received a \$145,672 Paycheck Protection Program loan (PPP Loan) from the SBA. The PPP loan matures in May 2022 and has an interest rate of 1% per annum and no payments are due until August 2021. If certain defined conditions are met, the PPP loan may be forgiven by the SBA. The Foundation anticipates being eligible for forgiveness.

Note 19 - Subsequent Events

In connection with the preparation of these consolidated financial statements, the Foundation evaluated subsequent events after the statement of consolidated financial position date at June 30, 2020 through May 12, 2021, which was the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.
